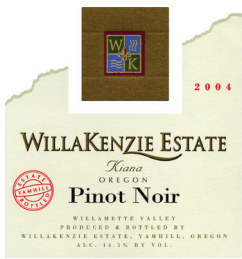
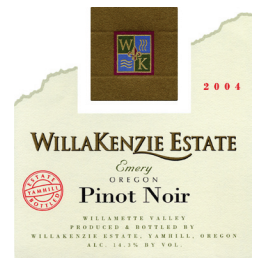

The Critics' Choice: WillaKenzie Estate 2004 Vineyard Designate Pinot Noirs



2004 Alette Pinot Noir

92 points: Wine & Spirits

"From WillaKenzie's oldest pinot vineyard, this dark and earthy wine is tight when first poured. But after a few short minutes it yields aromas of black cherry, then plum, the fruit providing context for scents of black earth and smoke. So too with the flavors: black at first, scored with gentle bitterness, then brighter, balanced with broad, muscular tannin. Built for the long haul, and for plank roasted salmon." *October 2007*

90 points: Wine Advocate

"...spent 12 months in 60% new French oak. It has a fragrant, smoky nose with generous cherry and red currant aromas. On the palate the wine is supple-textured, elegant, and friendly. Drink it over the next 4 years." *Jay Miller, October 2007*

"Light and crisp, showing a delicate rose petal overtone to the strawberry and red cherry flavors, lingering on the lithe finish." *Harvey Steiman, December 2007*

2004 Terres Basses Pinot Noir

91 points: Wine Enthusiast

"This is outstanding Pinot, from a vineyard yielding a miserly one ton per acre. Unfined and unfiltered, this dark, deeply-flavored wine offers scents and tastes of cut tobacco wrapped into rich blueberry fruit. Long and complex, it rewards your attention with notes of bitter chocolate and citrus rind as it winds through the lingering finish." *Paul Gregutt, November 15, 2007*

90 points: Wine Advocate

"...more darkly colored than the Emery. The nose hints of darker fruits as well as smoke and spice box. It is slightly narrow on the palate and firm but there is ample black cherry and blackberry flavored fruit to provide balance. It may prove to be the longest lived of these Pinot Noirs." *Jay Miller, October 2007*

2004 Kiana Pinot Noir

91 points: Wine Spectator

"Light and spicy, with cinnamon and nutmeg overtones prominent among the ripe currant flavors, lingering on the fine-tuned finish. Drink now through 2014." *Harvey Steiman, December 2007*

2004 Emery Pinot Noir

90 points: Wine Advocate

"...has a lovely perfume of pain grille, cherry, and black raspberry. Plush on the palate, it has better depth and enough structure for several years of evolution." *Jay Miller, October 2007*

90 points: Stephen Tanzer's

International Wine Cellar

"Ruby-red. Ripe cherry and cassis aromas are deep and expansive, with musky tobacco and roasted coffee notes adding complexity. Broad and chewy, with concentrated dark berry flavors, solid tannins and a suggestion of pomegranate molasses on the back. Finishes with impressively ripe cassis and kirsch notes and impressive length. A big boy." *Issue 132, May-June 2007*

2004 Triple Black Slopes Pinot Noir

91 points: Wine Enthusiast

"The name refers to the vineyards unusually steep slopes. The reward for farming such difficult terrain, the owners believe, is complexity, character and concentration. This is certainly the case in 2004, as this is the most dense and focused of the six WillaKenzie releases. It's built upon a solid foundation of black cherry fruit, but elevated with herb, acid and a feathery touch to the tannins. Despite its exceptional heft, the wine manages to feel elegant." *Paul Gregutt, November 15, 2007*
